Adding Zylkene Equine and Equistro Products to your Practice

Ears back. Tail swishing. Stomping. Cow-kicking. Bruxism.

It might be easy to dismiss these behaviors as merely horses being horses. We humans might not like going to the dentist. Horses don't like the farrier working with their feet. Seems simple enough, right? The reality is, these are all external signs of stress that many of your clients' horses face. Some horses may be stressed with the mere presence of your truck on the farm or seeing you work on another horse.

Classically, many farriers have turned to their veterinarian colleagues for an assist with some of these behaviors; often times in the form of chemical restraint. While fast-acting and effective at improving tractability,

these options are less than ideal for helping horses learn to tolerate the situation and the procedures performed on them. Additionally, these options often require injections which can exacerbate the stress response that they are intended to mitigate. Another option exists, that you can use in your practice immediately. Zylkene Equine is a behavioral health supplement that clients can easily keep in their barns to help horses cope with stressful situations, including farrier visits.

Before recommending any supplement, you may have questions about what it is and how it works. In adult animals, milk proteins are normally hydrolyzed by pepsin. Based on the principle that newborns, regardless of species, experience a sense of calm following nursing, the milk protein found in Zylkene Equine is broken down differently. This difference is with the active

ingredient, α -casozepine. It is made from bovine casein that has been hydrolyzed by trypsin. Trypsin is what newborns use to break down milk proteins. The beneficial properties of α -casozepine such as calmness and balanced behavior are seen without drowsiness.


Research out of the University of Pennsylvania demonstrated that semi-feral ponies given α-casozepine acclimatized to basic husbandry techniques and retained training better after 6 weeks than those given placebo. This research suggests that α-casozepine is a useful training aid in horses. This can be beneficial to your practice because, if clients use Zylkene Equine consistently, horses can become accustomed to farrier work, reducing the stress associated with your work. With less stressed horses, owners may be more inclined to follow your care recommendations.




